



A Hike in the Hills

There are some amazing hikes offered by the Escondido Creek Conservancy, escondidocreek.org/events, and I went on one of them in early February. It was a gorgeous day to hike. The sky was so clear that the views were amazing.

The hike was on a private land preserve near Lake Wohlford owned by the Conservancy. The only access is via a scheduled hike through the Conservancy. I was so glad I went.

It was a moderate uphill climb through native brush, which includes poison oak. I am very reactive to poison oak, so I was very careful, and all my clothes went straight into the wash! But it was worth it!

We stopped at several outlook spots, and since everyone in our group was up for it, we went all the way to the top. The last stretch is a bit steeper with rocky, uneven footing. At the top is a GIANT boulder that we scrabbled up and crab walked back down after spending some time at the top admiring the view.

We could see all of Escondido with Valley Parkway pointing straight at us. We could see both Lake Wohlford and Dixon Lake. We could see hills and valleys so wonderfully green! Our tour guide, Leonard Wittwer, knew the names of most of the peaks around us . . . quite impressive.

Leonard is the President of the Escondido Creek Conservancy and was one of the organizers to buy their first piece of land 30 years ago. The Conservancy now owns about 3000 acres and has helped preserve over 7000 more. While Leonard's focus is land acquisition and conservation, the Conservancy also has education programs for children and adults. 





On February 16, 2023,

temporary concrete barriers were placed to close the outside lane and shoulder on SB I-15 between Deer Springs Road and SR-78.


This closure will be in effect 24 hours per day for 8 months. When the work is complete, crews will reopen the newly paved SB lane and shoulder and immediately switch to closing the NB outside lane and shoulder with concrete barrier. This closure will be in effect for 24 hours per day for 8 months on NB I-15 between SR-78 and Deer Springs Road.

Improving the Freeway

The project will provide a superior, long-lasting roadway that improves driving comfort and reduces future maintenance and construction efforts. Less maintenance and construction in turn reduces traffic impacts for the traveling public and improves safety for both highway workers and motorists.

What to Expect

Construction began late Summer 2022 and should be completed by early 2025. The public will be notified of any weekend ramp closures. At the conclusion of the work, motorists will see and feel an improvement in ride quality and benefit from the increased service life of the roadway.


There will be a bake sale at 3 of these events. Stay tuned for which Faires will have the yummy baked goods.

Weed Team at Work in the Mountain Meadow Preserve

After a couple of Saturday cleanups, the Weed Team is now working every Wednesday at the Mountain Meadows Preserve, which the Escondido Creek Conservancy owns in partnership with the San Diego County Parks and Recreation and the Navy/Camp Pendleton. While pulling weeds is part of the cleanup job, the team is removing non-native plants and prepping the areas to be replanted with native plants. Tobacco tree, ice plant, Pride of Madera, non-native cacti, and a lot of dead branches are all going into the pile amongst others.

The area behind the new office building, that will be the new headquarters for the Escondido Creek Conservancy, will have a demonstration garden and the slope beyond that will be planted with native succulents. In clearing that space, we got a lot of laughs out of the things we found buried in the plants we removed. The first find was a small aluminum saucepan. We found one tennis shoe, two basketballs, a side panel from a green car, and lot of other odds and ends.

We created quite a pile to go out in the green waste, well, actually, two or three piles. In a couple weeks, the Conservancy will bring in a dumpster and our project of the week will be loading it! In the upcoming weeks, we will be clearing an access road, planting some native plants in the restoration area, and re-potting some young sage plants into larger pots. With 693 acres, there will always be something to do.

There are areas of the old avocado grove being replanted with natives as well. It is a big job! Juan Troncoso, our extremely knowledgeable Land Manager, is starting a program to have local residents start natives at home and bring them back when they are ready to be transplanted. He will also accept donations of natives if you have them growing in your yard, but don't need them. I've donated baby oak trees, Mountain Mahogany, a native daisy, and other natives that come up in my yard. I am also attempting to propagate from seed that I collected last fall.

Want to come get your hands dirty and help us turn this Preserve back to the plants and animals that should be there? 

"A World of Curiosities - by Louise Penny

When you google the term "evil" you will find there are many definitions of the word. Your perception of the meaning may depend on your religious upbringing, and possibly what you have read or experienced in life. For the purposes of this review, I am going to use the definition that I felt Penny used for this book: evil is "profound wickedness against the common good". The "evil", of course, will be the criminals. Some, will be the children that entered the lives of both Gamache and Beauvior many years ago, and then reentered their lives as adults. On the other side will be Gamache and all the people that are associated with the village of Three Pines. They represent the "common good".

I have read all of Penny's books. This one by far was her most unusual, and you might not like the subject matter. There were many moving parts to this plot. I felt the ending was one of her best, and it will keep you on edge and keep you guessing. Several of my friends read this novel, and we all agreed that the ending left us with a question. Was this really a novel about forgiveness?

Elder and dependent adults abuse

The San Diego County Sheriff's Department receives and investigates an array of calls each day. One of the crimes we investigate is Elder Abuse and/or Dependent Adult Abuse. According to California State Penal Code 368 P.C., the State of California considers those persons age 65 and older to be elders. Persons 18-64 years old who have physical and/or mental limitations that restrict their ability to carry out normal activities or to protect their rights are considered dependent adults.

The types of abuse can be:

- **Physical**: Striking, hitting, pushing, shoving, physical restraint, lack of medical care
- **Sexual**: Non-consensual acts, sexual assault, sexual exploitation
- Emotional/Psychological: Threats, insults, intimidation, harassment, isolation
- **Financial:** Fraud, forgery, identity theft, scams, embezzlement
- **Neglect:** Denial of or inadequate food, clothing, shelter, medical care, provision for basic needs

It is estimated that 1 in 10 adults aged 65 and older experience elder abuse in a given year. Some sources claim it to be 1 in 6. This is a very serious and under reported crime that occurs in every city. Abusers are both women and men. About two thirds of the abusers are family members and occurs in the home. Care facilities (nursing homes and senior living centers) are another setting that abuse may occur. Dependent adults are also the victim of abuse. They may

not have the ability to voice or tell someone about the abuse. The victims may be isolated by the abuser or scared to tell someone they are being abused.

Some signs elder or dependent care abuse **may be** occurring:

- Person seems depressed, confused, or withdrawn
- Person is isolated from family and friends
- Has unexplained bruises, burns, or scars
- Appears dirty, underfed, dehydrated, over or undermedicated, or not receiving needed care for medical problems
- Has bed sores or other preventable conditions
- Recent changes in banking or spending patterns How to report abuse and resources:




