2nd annual Green Transpo Expo will be April 22 at mall

The Greater Escondido Chamber of Commerce's second annual Green Transpo Expo will be held at North County Mall on Saturday, April 22 – Earth Day – from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Attendees will learn about everything from electric cars, bikes and school buses to EV trends, alternative fuels, and home solar & battery storage. Our entire transportation system is rapidly changing, and this event will help educate guests on what it is all about...and what is coming next!

The event starts with the "Cars & Coffee" meet-up at 9 a.m. Car enthusiasts and car clubs are invited to attend for an inclusive car mashup to merge the past and the future of transportation.

The Mayor of Escondido Dane White and James Rowten (JR), Greater Escondido Chamber CEO, will kick off the Expo with a ribbon cutting at 11:30 a.m. The main event will include an education forum, exhibits, robotics demonstrations and vendors throughout the day. The mayor and Rowten will be joined by Congressman Scott Peters, 5th District Supervisor Jim Desmond and other city, county, and state officials to kick-off the event.

Like last year, an extended educational forum with Q&A will coincide with the event throughout the day, with expert presenters from EVinfo.net, SDG&E, California State University San Marcos (CSUSM), Electric Vehicle Association

of San Diego, ALIVE Solar, and more. Electric bikes will also be on hand to test ride.

"People throughout the community, and state, are seeing energy price spikes," said Rowten. "Now more than ever, people are looking for alternatives to help their wallet and the environment. It can be overwhelming to determine where to start – the Green Transpo Expo can help educate and guide local consumers as to what's available and how to implement the alternatives."
















Lotus Pond Adventure 3-10-23

What is the Hidden Meadows Garden Club doing at Lotus Pond? We are there to visit a spot of Hidden Meadows that I have heard of, but have never seen. Lotus Pond is a manmadereservoir that is seasonally replenished by the Reidy Creek watershed. We are there to walk around (hike) and enjoy the scenery.

Our event started out by meeting at the entrance of Lotus Pond where everyone parked their cars. Mike Quadrozzi, our fantastic event leader gathered the crowd of 24 people who signed in for this adventure. Electricity prices are out of control in California, most notably in San Diego County. A few weeks ago, I discussed the many reasons behind the dramatic increase in our bills, but the fact remains that California's utility rates are consistently 30% higher than the national average. All of this comes as San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E) is set to increase their rates yet again. This isn't right, and something needs to be done.

Last week, I wrote a letter to the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) urging them to minimize San Diego Gas and Electric's rate increase. I am also calling on the State of California to implement measures to alleviate rising energy costs, providing relief to the ratepayers of San Diego.

For many San Diegans, the recent 24.6% jump in gas rates and 7.8% increase in electricity rates is more than they can afford ... in an already expensive California.

In order to make change, I need your help. The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) will hold several public forums to provide an opportunity for customers of San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E) to offer perspective and input about the company's rate requests.

On March 23, at 2:30 p.m. SDG&E will hold a meeting at the Sherman Heights Community Center, Multipurpose Room, 2nd Floor 2258 Island Ave., San Diego, CA 92102.

The public forum will begin with a brief overview of SDG&E's requests, then public comments will be heard. At least one representative from the utility company will be available to customers during the public forum for individual service, including billing issues.

If you can't make the forums, then I encourage you to take action by leaving a public comment. Here is a link to SDG&E's General Rate Case: https://apps.cpuc.ca.gov/p/a2205016.

I will do all I can to help lower the costs of electricity bills in San Diego, but CPUC needs to hear from you too. Together we can make a change and make San Diego more affordable.

Jim Desmond is a member of the San Diego County Board of Supervisors. He represents the 5th District, which includes Escondido, Valley Center, Pauma Valley, Palomar Mountain and much of the Backcountry.

Escondido Creek Adventure Camp is a wildly engaging 5-day outdoor summer day camp. Campers explore the enchanting Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve, where they discover the natural world by hiking, playing, and conducting handson science! The wide variety of activities includes guided exploration, arts and crafts, games, science experiments, story time, visits from special live animal ambassadors, and more! Each of the five days at camp will have a different theme, including Exploration and Discovery, Plants and Pollinators, Amazing Animal Adaptations, Watershed Wonders, and Pollution & the Solution.

Each day begins and ends at Grape Day Park in downtown Escondido, allowing the campers the opportunity to observe the connection between the urban portion of the creek upstream and the more natural section of the creek downstream, plus it allows them the chance to use the playground and socialize with their fellow campers. We provide transportation from Grape Day Park to Elfin Forest and back.

Last year, this camp cost \$275 per child. 2023 costs have not yet been set.



temporary concrete barriers were placed to close the outside lane and shoulder on SB I-15 between Deer Springs Road and SR-78.







This is the fourth book written by Karen Cleveland. She is a former counterterrorism CIA analyst, and her background helps her come up with some really exciting books.

"The New Neighbor - by Karen Cleveland - political thriller

Beth Bradford loves her neighborhood. She lives on a cul-desac. She knows all of her neighbors because, like Beth, they are all government employees that work in different departments for the CIA.

The last of her three children has just entered college, and it is time to downsize to a condo with her husband. Her home life has been perfect, and her counterterrorism job is challenging; but things are about to change...and not for the better.

Her husband tells her he is moving out. He has found someone else, and their marriage is over. Her next shock comes when she goes to work, and finds out she has been seriously downgraded from her former position. She is now in another building and everything in her office has been removed. She is not hunting terrorists, she is now teaching new agents.

For years she has been trying to find Reza Karimi. He is an Iranian terrorist: a foreign agent that has been put in place to recruit employees, and infiltrate the government. She knows she is close, but apparently her time is up. Someone else has been put in her place. different events throughout the year such as: birthday parties, weddings, country yard sales, Spring food festivals, craft fairs, car shows, dog shows, weekend family camping, and many other activities. They derive their main income mostly from their famous huge pumpkins that they sell to companies and organizations. Their pumpkin patch is the largest in San Diego. I took my grandkids there when they were small children to get 2 pumpkins. I remember riding them around in a huge wheelbarrow seeking for the best pumpkins to take home. And believe me, there were hundreds to pick from. The kids loved it and had a great time!

After our short lecture the guide diverted us to the buffet table for our lunch – consisting of BBQ roast beef (super delicious), ham, baked beans, cole slaw, butter rolls and drinks. All the food was good and tasty. Eating sitting on a picnic bench under the sun was ooh, so nice to warm up. On the table were packets of trail mix for each of us and a packet of corn to feed the animals. A lectured followed on the history of the nuts in their farm. I was surprised to find out that most of their nuts are grown elsewhere and that most nuts are grown on trees, but that peanuts are grown on the ground like a bean. An illustration followed on the correct way to crack a walnut. We then went on a tour of the premises to the roasting, packaging, and storage rooms. se colocaron muros de contención temporales para cerrar el carril y acotamiento exteriores de la I-15 sur entre Deer Springs Road y SR-78.










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
