# Lower Moosa Canyon treatment plant VCMWD adds eighth solar array

Early May 2023, the Valley Center Municipal Water District brought online its 8th Photovoltaic Solar Array at the Lower Moosa Canyon Water Reclamation Facility (Moosa) located near Circle R Drive and Old 395.

Rated at 278 kW, the Moosa solar array will generate over 415,000 kWh of solar energy at a current projected savings of just over \$68,000 per year. This represents a power cost savings at the wastewater reclamation facility of 68.5% compared to the current annual energy cost of \$100,000, and 6.35% in the overall operational cost of the plant

Built under Power Purchase Agreement (PPA), the array was planned, designed, constructed, and maintained by a third party, SunRenu. The district will buy all of the power from the array over a 25-year period, with net savings compared to purchasing it from


SDG&E going to the district.

Three years in development, "Moosa" is the eighth solar array in the district's fleet of renewable energy facilities. It joins seven other arrays, ranging in size from 1.1 Mgwt at Lake Turner to two, 30 kW units at the Cobb Reservoir and MJM Pump Station, spread over the district's service area helping to power its 29 pump stations. Six of the district's seven solar arrays (except Lake Turner) were designed, built, and brought online by district inhouse technical and construction personnel.

Moosa will be the first to offset power costs at a wastewater reclamation

Since the inception of the program, the district's solar assets have generated 28.5 million kilowatt hours of

# Valley Center's biggest weekend is almost here!

Although Valley Center's biggest weekend, the Western Days parade and festival, is arriving amidst an extended period of May and June gloom, the mood among volunteers is anything but gloomy! They are preparing to bring residents a rousing parade, a rip-roaring Guns & Hoses Chili Cook-off, the climax to the Honorary Mayor's race, topped off by what is probably the largest festival ever. At the festival grounds on Lilac Road there will be a first ever Car Corral, a celebration of classic and every other kind of car.

That parade will be led by hometown girl Morgan Leigh, a country western sensation who is this year's parade Grand Marshal. The parade will begin at 10 a.m. and should be over before noon. The parade will begin on Cole Grade at the County yards, turn right on Valley Center Road and continue to Old Road, although some car and horse entries will turn right onto Lilac.

Just make sure that you get yourself in place to enjoy the parade by being along Valley Center Road by about 8:30 a.m. when the roads close. There will be six announcers spread along the parade route to increase your enjoyment by giving you facts and details about each of the entries. They include Tabitha Martin, Craig Adams, David Ross, Charles & Marsi Carr (which count as one,) Jamie Zeller and Oliver Smith. Pick out your favorite and bring along a camp chair if you are inclined to take it easy. There will be many floats and walking

Before the parade Valley Center Trails is sponsoring the 5K running and walking event along the parade route. You can show up and sign up.

Also before the parade, get yourself a hearty pancake breakfast in the parking lot of Valley Towne Centre (the same center as the deli and The Hidden Meadows News office) where the Rotary Club of Valley Center and a dedicated group of volunteers will serve up pancakes, scrambled eggs, sausage and orange juice, among other items. It's all fresh and hot off the griddle.

The Hidden Meadows News spoke to Laura Gordon, president of the Western Days board and parade coordinator, who shared that a countywide infection of a horse virus called VSV is cutting into the equine entries for the parade. "More than half of the equine units could be affected," said Gordon. "We have definitely lost at least half and it may be more than that. Our Escondido Mounted Posse will be walking with the colors. They will be the 'non-mounted' posse due to the disease." In addition, the ro-deo queen and the VC Vaqueros will be riding on floats instead of mounted.

Gordon estimated that as of now the number of parade entries are in the '80s, with a few more being expected. Of course, they don't encourage last minute parade entries as that creates organizational problems. But some late comers usually do slip through. In fact, that's almost a given.

As of this writing, the biggest challenge was rounding up some convertibles to provide parade rides for the Miss Valley Center queens and princesses.

Allow a few minutes after the last entry goes by for the road to clear and for CHP to reopen the roads.

New features at the festival, which is again being held at the Valley Center Municipal Water District property on Lilac Road, are the car show and the blood drive. "We tried to have a car show at the festival last year, but we had issues,"

# Lending a Hand

On a pleasant Friday morning in May, Randy Mitchell, David Roberts and Tom and Ginger Green lent a hand to the Escondido Creek Conservancy to repair a tool shed. A huge rock, as tall as the shed, rolled up against the cement block wall of the shed damaging the roof in the process. The volunteers along with staff opened up the roof to repair it and found it was going to be a bigger job than anticipated. The support beams had dry rot. They cut out the dry rot, installed new sections of support beams and, then, got to the roof repair. They also installed a new vent screen to keep critters and bees out of the structure. The project took longer than expected so the door still needs repair and repainting. And there is a list of other projects such as installing a sprinkler system in the nursery and tearing down what's left of an old

structure that housed workers for the avocado grove.

That grove is now gone and the Conservancy is work-

ing to restore that land to native habitat.

When the shed repair is complete, it will be stocked with tools for the Working Wednesday Weed Team. The Weed Team works weekly on Wednesdays pulling non-native plants and weeds, starting and nurturing new natives in the Mountain Meadows Preserve Nursery, and restoring areas to native habitat. Soon the Wednesday team will be collecting seeds from natives for propagation in the nursery or directly in the field.

The repair/demolition/sprinkler team works occasional Fridays.

With about 10 staff members, the Conservancy is staffed lightly for a very big job, protecting 3,000 acres throughout the Escondido Creek watershed and annually providing outdoor education programs to thousands of children and adults. The office will be the home base for all Conservancy staff, including those who are in the field a lot of the time taking care of nature and providing outdoor education programs for Escondido students.

Jacqueline Winspear's new novel "The White Lady" did not disappoint me. After reading the Maisie Dobbs' books for years and years, I could only hope that while she seemed to be ending that series she would come up with something special for her next undertaking. I guess we will only know when her next book comes out if this one is a standalone novel, or if she plans on going forward with this character. She is still staying with her formula of using the background of England during the war years with a single woman caught up in the chaos of the times.

"The White Lady" by Jacqueline Winspear

In 1914 when Elinor De Witt was 10 years old, she tried to flee along with her sister and mother to England before the invasion of Belgium by Germany. Her father had already enlisted in the army, and he urged his family to leave as quickly as possible. Boarding a train for the coast and hoping to find passage on a boat heading for England, they suddenly are stranded when the train stops. Walking for miles they finally reach the coast only to find that all the boats are full, and they have to return home.

Thus begins the story of a 10 year old child and her sister that are recruited by a woman named Isabelle to help gain information about the German occupiers. They are used as observers and lookouts for troop and equipment movements on the trains crossing the country. As the years pass they receive more instruction and assignments. Elinor advances quickly while her sister resists the additional training. By the time Elinor is 14, she has learned how to shoot a gun and hit a target, and the assignments she is asked to fulfill become more

This novel will capture the experience of war seen through the eyes of an innocent child, and her later emergence as a skilled covert operative that is eventually involved in both wars. When she leaves the service she settles in England in small village seeking peace and anonymity; but what she finds is a dangerous situation with new enemies and old tainted colleagues.

clean, renewable power and saved the District and its ratepayers over \$1.5 million in energy costs and state solar rebates. In the process, the district has offset almost 9,200 metric tons of CO2 generation.

Finally, the district sells its "Renewable Energy Credits" generated by the arrays to the open market.

Next in line is the 172 kW Corporate Facility Array, anticipated to generate 290,000 kWh annually, to offset the power costs at the district administrative and operations ("corporate") center. Also, in process for three years, this "PPA" project has been impacted by material, equipment, and labor shortages. It is now anticipated that the corporate array will be completed, up and running by the end of 2023.

is Chairman of the Board of Directors and extremely knowledgeable about the land, plants, and animals in the area.

We learned a lot about the history of the Conservancy, which is now 32 years old. Leonard pointed out areas that they would like to see preserved and areas that are not currently at risk but could be in the future. An example of that is the Miriam Mountain land that the Golden Door purchased. IF, someday, the Golden Door was sold or they decided they could no longer hold the Miriam Mountain land, it could be sold . . . and that could be to a developer. The Conservancy watches these things and, working with their various partners, tries to find ways to preserve these lands.

In addition to the amazing views and stories about protecting the land, we learned a lot about native plants and some invasive ones. We saw some Cardinal Catchfly's with their bright red flowers and monkey flowers, which are also red. There were various types of Phacelia. My favorite is the Phacelia grandiflora with its 1-1.5" purple flowers. We saw Death camas whose lovely white flowers are poisonous. And Dainty little skullcap was all along the route.

We were near the Coco's fire area and saw some striking images of burned out manzanita groves sticking out of the new post-fire growth. An interesting note is that there is very little nonnative plants or weeds in the area that burned in contrast to the adjoining areas where the nonnative growth has invaded.

I was joined on this hike by my friends and neighbors, Meredith Kifer and Karen Soriano. We had a wonderful morning roaming the hills. We managed to reserve spots on the June hike, which is already full! We will be exploring Meisha Canvon!

"We have good headliner bands, including Sarah Petit on Friday and Morgan Leigh on Saturday." She added, "Morgan is Valley Center home grown, which is why we are proud to have her as the grand marshal of the parade."

Gordon was very grateful to the event's title sponsor. "We definitely want to thank the Rincon

tribe for being our title sponsor. The Rincon tribal council was awarded the Spirit of the Community last week and will be riding in the parade.

"It's a great event that brings the community together," said Gordon. "We hope the new residents come out as well. It's always a fun two days."



The display commemorates the 175th anniversary of the discovery of gold in California and celebrates the 200th birthday of the Valley Center woman who identified the first gold nugget, an event that sparked what is arguably the single most important moment in California history.

The local connection to the Gold Rush of 1848 is through Elizabeth Jane (Jennie) Wimmer— who lived in Valley Center and is buried at the local cemetery.

She identified the first piece of gold at Sutter's Mill and is generally considered the co-discoverer of California Gold along with James Marshall, the superintendent of the mill who pulled out a pellet from the American River. It was the size of a pea. Jennie was the only person in the camp who knew how to test for gold. The path of history was forever changed.

#### So, where's the nugget?

Marshall gave the historic gold nugget to Jennie who carried the tiny piece of gold in a buckskin pouch around her neck for 40 years.

In 1885, she filed an affidavit with the County of San Diego attesting to the fact that the nugget she carried was the original piece of gold. A copy of that affidavit is on display at the History Museum.

Later that year, she sold the famous piece of history to Oakland attorney W.W. Allen who promised to write a book, but didn't. He sold the nugget to Chicago industrialist Charles F. Gunther, owner of America's largest

collection of historical artifacts. Gunther later sold his entire collection to the Chicago Historical Society.

In 1923, Gunther's family bought back the nugget and placed it in a vault at their winter home in Altadena, California. In 1956, it was acquired by the Bancroft Library at UC Berkeley where it is known as the Wimmer Nugget and remains today in safekeeping. A facsimile is on public exhibit there and at the Valley Center History Museum.

#### Panning for gold

To celebrate the birthdate of Jennie Wimmer, the Valley Center Library and History Museum are making plans for a gold panning event. At this writing, the happening is scheduled for Saturday, June 17, from 12 noon to 4 p.m. in the courtyard outside the campus both buildings share on Cole Grade Road. Specific details are to be announced as the date approaches.

The Wimmer homestead on 165 acres, no longer standing, was at the northwest corner of Cole Grade & Cool Valley roads. She and husband Peter raised several of their seven children here. Descendants of the Wimmers still live in California and many were in Valley Center on October 5, 2003, when the Valley Center Historical Society unveiled a bronze marker at the local cemetery in memory of Jennie Wimmer.

Documentation on the discovery of gold, the Wimmer connection, and related information is on exhibit and in the archives of the Valley Center History Museum at 29200 Cole Grade Road. 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
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# The Academy Museum of Motion Pictures: And the Winner is.....

The seniors are off to the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures located in the Miracle Mile of L.A. It was great that on a cloudy rainy day someone else is doing the driving. We made our usual "comfort" stop in Orange County and headed for Los Angeles. Looking out the window, I saw lots of construction-they are digging to construct a subway and a new convention center. So it's a mess driving around. And guess what?? No smog, remember the 70s and 80s? I noticed the red-white striped Petersen Car Museum is next door, the Museum of Modern Art is nearby, the La Brea Tar Pits are across the street (they have not moved), and the original Farmers Market not too

far. The Market is an open air marketplace with more than 100 merchants with lots of shopping. However, I opted not to go, I had been there a few years ago – not too fond of walking in the pouring rain. There is also a large park situated behind the museum - great for kids.

The Academy Museum of Motion Pictures features 2 buildings – it's a renovation and expansion of the May Company located across the Tar Pits on Fairfax. The architecture of the museum is modern art deco style?? occupying 300,00 square feet. Looking at the building from the outside you see a spherical glass/steel structure added to the north side of the building with a huge open terrace where there's a magnificent view of the Hollywood Hills. There's a bridge at the top floor to go to this area. On the first floor is a 2 story

restaurant called Fanny, after Fanny Brice. a popular star of the 20s and a gift shop. I was surprised to see that they had a whole area both at the gift shop and at the exhibits for Pedro Almodovar, a Spanish filmmaker whose movies are outstanding. In the middle of the open space are escalators (and elevators) for visiting the exhibit floors. Each floor offers different topics: "Stories of Cinema, Path to Cinema: Highlights from the Richard Balzer Collection; Backdrop: An Invisible Art (on the wall there's a huge 3-dimensional backdrop of Mount Rushmore used in movies), and The Oscar's Experience – where you can step into the stage of the Dolby Theater and make believe you are accepting an Oscar (I did not go in there, I was not accepting an Oscar today, besides it costs \$15.)

The Academy Awards History are in a circular gallery featuring the Oscar winners since 1929. Would you believe the Oscar statuette weighs 8 ½ lbs. It's all muscle. Other galleries include: the Directors Inspiration Gallery; Performance and Sound and Identity Gallery; Animation, and Effects and Encounters Gallery.

To start, when stepping out of the escalator on the 2nd floor, you encounter a large wide open space and there are huge glass doors that open taking you into a dark room where there are movies shown of the past, lots of photographs of different movie stars in the setting of the famous movie they starred in. By the way, all the exhibit rooms are semi dark, and movies shown in most exhibits. There's a large area dedicated to the movie "Boys in the Hood", the 3rd floor is dedicated to Black actors, dancers, etc. depicting their contribution to the movie industry. A whole room was dedicated to the movie "The Godfather." Showing various takes of the movie, costume and a video showing how they applied the makeup on Marlon Brando to give him the swollen jowls on his face. They even had the horse head that appeared in the movie (on the bed). Would you believe it was a real horse's head I was looking at!! YUK!! – a taxidermist stuffed it. Another Yuk!

The other floors exhibited costumes worn in various movies, and showed some of the characters like R2D2 robot, monsters, ogres, and many scary characters. I particularly liked a video they showed how they do the special effects scenes, such as in Harrison Ford's escape from the cave with a huge rock after him. Very interesting.

There's lots to see and do at the Museum. Admission \$25, Open Monday - Thursday, 10 to 6 pm, Fri-Sat 10 – 8 pm.

Museum rules: large backpacks, purses - check in at cloakroom, no outside food. They put out a monthly calendar which features limited series and spotlights, ongoing film series, ongoing education programs, dropin tours, workshops, movie screening (dating from the 30s to the present. The Museum is a very impressive place for those interested in cinema.


dron. The last two years this wasn't possible due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
