SANDAG CEO Hasan Ikhtrata to leave in December



SANDAG (San Diego Association of Governments) CEO Hasan Ikhtrata submitted his notice to the Board of Directors Friday evening. His last day with the agency will be December 29.

SANDAG is the regional agency that controls national and state traffic funds. Its board of directors comes from city mayors and members of the Board of Supervisors. It has an annual budget of more than \$1 billion.

"I came to SANDAG almost five years ago to reinvigorate this organization and reimagine a brighter future for the San Diego region," said Ikhtrata. "Together, with the amazing SANDAG team, we have done just that, tackling long-standing issues such as transit to the airport, the falling Del Mar Bluffs, building a third crossing at the U.S.-Mexico border, and the need for free transit, more bikeways and housing. Our bold vision has garnered support from federal and state funding agencies, with more than \$1 billion in investments coming to the region. As the agency starts its next chapter, this is the right time to hand over the leadership reins."

Under Ikhtrata, more than \$1 billion in funds were awarded for projects throughout the San Diego region and major progress was made on several, key regional priorities.

"This news is a bittersweet moment for our region," said SANDAG and San Diego County Board of Supervisors Chairwoman Nora Vargas, "I am grateful for Hasan's vision, leadership, and unwavering commitment to helping us all reimagine the future of the San Diego region. Throughout his tenure, Hasan has spearheaded transformative changes in transportation and regional planning for the County of San Diego, and I want to wish him the best in his next endeavor. I also want to thank SANDAG staff for all the work they continue to do and I look forward to continuing to deliver on all of our projects and priorities for the San Diego region."

Chairwoman Vargas will lead the transition with the SANDAG Board to discuss next steps to fill the CEO role.

Ikhtrata has been a controversial figure, especially in North County, where his priorities for traffic spending lean heavily toward mass transit, at the expense of more spending for Hwy 78. In May Escondido Mayor Dane White, who is Escondido's representative on the SANDAG board, criticized SANDAG's most recent budget for "[seeking] to fund public transportation proj-

ects that few residents use, ignores the needs of North County to instead fund projects to the south, and punishes working families who rely on our roads and freeways to get to work and make a living."

In January White joined eight other city representatives who stalked out of a meeting in protest of the SANDAG weighted voting system—created by former Assemblywoman Lorena Gonzalez—that puts most decision-making into the hands of San Diego city and one other city.

Ikhtrata's regime also came under scrutiny by an independent audit, as reported by the online newspaper *inewssource*, which reported May 8, 2023: "The report released late Friday by SANDAG's Office of the Independent Performance Auditor flagged large contract amendments that lacked board approval, missing and poorly kept paperwork, and millions of dollars in consultant payments for work that auditors argued could have been done by in-house staff." The auditor

also criticized the administration for what *inewssource* called: "insufficient documentation and employee credit card misuse, including Ikhtrata's own questionable spending."

March 29 of this year SANDAG's board evaluated Ikhtrata's performance, but did not report publicly how the board rated him. After the evaluation his salary stayed exactly the same: \$414,000.

Recently SANDAG began looking at "congestion pricing," for 800 miles of highway in S.D. County. As well as per-mile fees on drivers.

Fifth District Supervisor Jim Desmond, who has clashed with Ikhtrata many times over the years, commented: "I am encouraged to hear about Hasan Ikhtrata's departure from SANDAG. This development opens the door to changes and progress within the organization. SANDAG's primary focus must be on finding a new leader who embodies the qualities of a consensus builder who can collaborate effectively with all cities and unincorporated area communities in San Diego County."

Desmond added, "SANDAG should prioritize taxpayers' needs and use San Diegans' hard-earned money efficiently and responsibly. I am committed to supporting a new SANDAG executive who will diligently work toward designing a comprehensive regional transportation plan that addresses the needs of the entire region, including freeways and roads."

He concluded, "The new can-

Self-driving cars?

Recently, I was able to tour Waymo, which is an autonomous driving technology company owned by Alphabet Inc., Google's parent company. Waymo is similar to a self-driving Uber.

Though it was a bit eerie getting in a car that didn't have a driver, I was really impressed by the safety and convenience of the process. The way it works is using an app (similar to Uber) you summon a car and enter your destination. Once the car picks you up, you put on your seatbelt and press go on the screen.

One of the most impressive things about Waymo's technology is the extensive testing and safety measures in place. We don't want to admit it, but humans cause the majority of accidents. A recent study done by Waymo showed over a million miles driven and only two accidents with their cars, both of which were caused by the other human driver.

The Waymo vehicle easily reacted to yields, four-way stops and other scenarios it encountered. During the tour, I learned about the various components that make up the technology, including sensors, cameras, and advanced software that enables Waymo's self-driving cars to navigate through complex environments seamlessly.

I believe that autonomous driving technology like Waymo's will transform the way we travel and create safer and more efficient transportation options for people around the world.

Let me know what you think about driving cars, and, would you like to see the technology expand?

For a movie fan such as myself, who had been knee-capped by COVID and the delays that the industry has shown in recovering from its effects, it almost set me to dancing to celebrate a good, old-fashioned movie night. I saw "Oppenheimer" the opening weekend, and enjoyed it so much I plan to see it again.

It was only last week that the city announced that it has—working with several stakeholders—hammered together a deal that keeps the movie chain firmly attached to Escondido.

So, as said earlier, for the moment the classic movie experience we've loved for a century and more seems to be reviving. Although we'll have to see whether the writers and actors strike currently going on will deal a suicidal death blow to Hollywood in a sort of circular firing squad that might leave no one standing.

That would be a tragedy if, just as the public decides that it likes what it sees and is starting to come out to the movies again, that labor and management can't hammer out a deal.

Meantime, let's do what we can to support our local cinema. How? By going to the movies!

Supporting local firefighters

Local fire departments are essential for public safety. By responding rapidly to wildfires and other emergencies, they save countless lives. Ensuring they have the means to perform this critical task has been a big priority for me in Sacramento.

Through recent budget cycles, I have obtained almost \$14 million for fire agencies in many parts of San Diego County. For example, I acquired funding for the Rincon Fire Department for a new brush fire apparatus and other badly needed upgrades. Just last week, I was invited to a community ceremony inaugurating the Valley Center Fire Protection District's new brush fire apparatus, purchased with funds I was able to secure from the state budget.

I obtained these funds when California's budget picture was much brighter, with surpluses in the billions. But this session, despite California's current deficit, I was able to secure funds for both the San Miguel Fire Department in East County, and North County Fire, serving the Fallbrook area. The two districts will each receive \$500,000, to be used for new fire stations and future upgrades. And in previous budget cycles, I also secured millions for the Deer Springs Fire Protection District, North County Fire and the San Marcos Fire Department, for new stations and safety enhancements for firefighters.

Last week in Pala I participated in a ceremony recognizing the new partnership between the California Office of Emergency Services (OES) and the Pala Fire Department, establishing a historic mutual aid relationship between the state and a tribal fire department. Though this didn't involve a funding request, I supported this important agreement in the Assembly. As a result, a new brush fire engine provided by OES will be stationed in Pala to serve that community and surrounding areas.

As your Assembly representative, I do all I can to make sure our local fire fighters have everything they need to do their jobs safely and effectively as they risk their lives saving ours and keeping our region more fire resilient.

Impersonator scam -- who's really on the phone?

As tax season ends, it's the perfect time to remind the public that if you get a call from the "IRS" saying you owe money and you need to pay immediately using cryptocurrency, a gift card or some other unusual form of payment, this is a scam.

Even if your caller ID says IRS or any other legitimate sounding government agency, know that career scammers use technology to make any number they want appear on a

caller ID. No government agency will call, text or reach out via social media and threaten to arrest you if you do not pay. In addition, cryptocurrency, gift cards or a wire transfer service are never forms of payment with government agencies, so you should see requests like this as a red flag.

Impersonation scams were the top reported scam in 2022 according to data released by the Federal Trade

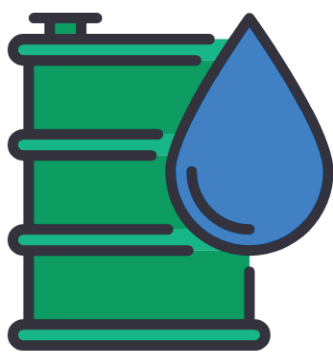

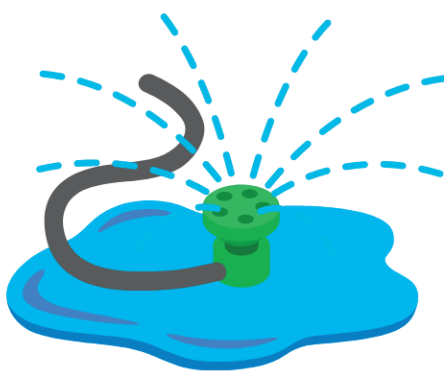

Commission (FTC), which reports that it received more than 700,000 reports about impersonation scams, many of them involving the loss of money.

Here are tips on how to avoid being scammed by an impersonator:

- Do not provide your social security number or banking information to any caller, even if the caller ID shows IRS, Social Security or another known government agency.
- If you get one of these calls, hang up and call the IRS or government office yourself to verify.
- Scammers use technology to make any number they want appear on a caller ID.
- Many calls cannot be traced because they originate overseas.
- If you get a call saying someone you know is in jail and needs bail money, verify this is actually the case by contacting the person that the caller claims is in jail and their immediate family members.
- If the caller tells you not to tell anyone about your conversation, hang up. It is a scam.
- Never pay anyone who insists you pay with cryptocurrency, a wire transfer service like Western Union or MoneyGram, or a gift card – this is a typical method that scammers use to bilk you.
- Never click on links in unexpected emails or text messages including those that claim to be your Apple, Netflix, Amazon, or any other

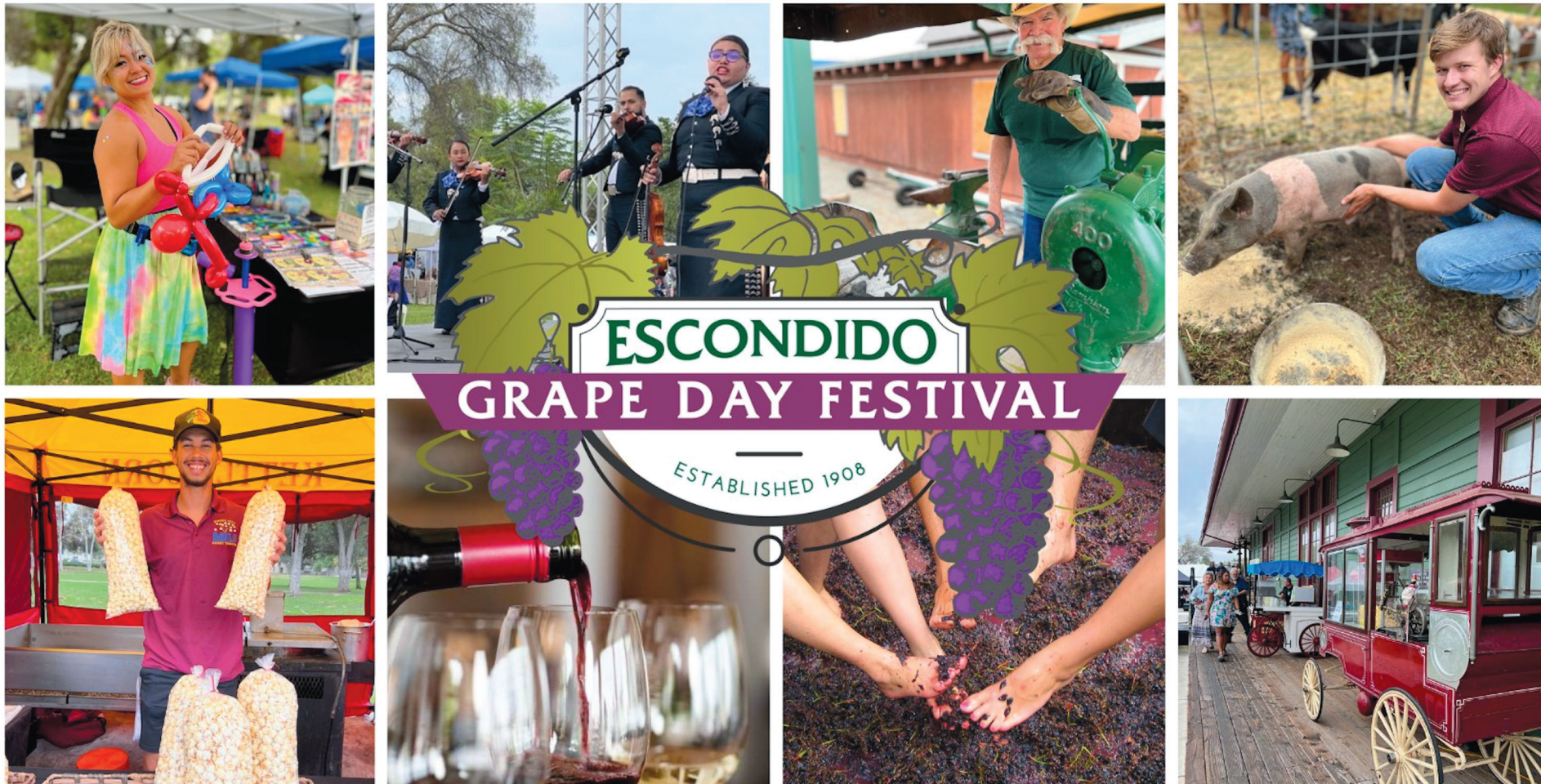

**Tony Bennett's musical refuge:
a journey through Alzheimer's**

In the final chapter of his illustrious life, Tony Bennett, the legendary crooner, faced a formidable adversary - Alzheimer's disease. This cruel ailment, known for robbing individuals of cherished memories and leaving behind a fog of confusion, seemed to spare one remarkable aspect of Bennett's mind - his encyclopedic knowledge of lyrics. Commerce joined forces in writing letters of encouragement, urging the movie theater, Regal Cinemas, to remain an integral part of the downtown Escondido community.”

Escondido Creek Conservancy

The Hidden Meadows Garden Club July meeting was held at Faraj and Yasuko Tavangari’s beautiful home with 29 attendees. The home located in what I call “Boulder City” is a one of a kind structure. Most of the homes in that area are built around these magnificent huge boulders lending them an opulent façade.

As usual, here I am in unknown territory, getting lost again— not really I did find the street, but the numbers—mama mia! They do not post their address in large numbers so that old ladies like me can read them from their cars. However, luck strikes again, Linda Collins was arriving at the same time and led me to the right house. On the outside, the house is very modern and meticulous in its landscape. As we entered it has an open floor plan and we then proceeded to go to the yard. The house has an infinity pool, the yard is divided by a sitting area, BBQ area, and of course lots of boulders to accentuate its surroundings and the view is awesome.

A presentation was to be given concerning the Escondido Creek Conservancy. Linda Collins, introduced Ann Van Leer, Executive Director of the Escondido Creek Conservancy, and Jeff Swenerton, a Conservancy board member for 17 years and past member of the Board of Directors. Jeff is now co-chair of the new Seed the Future campaign involved in the Conservancy’s outdoor education programs.

Jeff began by giving us the background on how it all started. The Conservancy started in 1998 by a group of home owners in Elfin Forest watching developers taking over the nearby lands threatening plant and wildlife populations. The group decided to get together and sought to find a way to protect and retain the nearby natural lands and plants for animals and for present and future generations to enjoy. “Keep It Rural” was their motto. As a result of that effort the Conservancy now owns over 3,000 acres and helps preserve over 7000 acres of conservation land.

The Escondido Creek watershed extends from above Lake Wohlford, through the City of Escondido, Harmony Grove, Elfin Forest and Olivenhain, Rancho Santa Fe, and into the San Elijo lagoon in Solana Beach and Encinitas. The communities involved are Escondido, Encinitas, San Marcos, Solana Beach, Cardiff

and others.

In managing over 3,000 acres some areas are open to the public and others are managed as private reserves in an effort to provide wildlife corridors and for scientific research. This is to be accomplished by educating and advocating for the natural surroundings.

They presently have an education program for children and adults so they can experience involvement with nature first hand and have a safe and beautiful place to hike, walk, bike, boat, etc. The land is partly maintained by the help of government agencies and volunteers such as Linda, Jeff, Mike Quandrozzi and many others who clean, plant, and conduct educational programs for both children and adults.

After the presentation, the meeting continued with a question and answer period. At the conclusion, Linda announced that she has seeds of different native plants that she wants to give to interested members to propagate them and when they grow they are to be planted to fill in the recently acquired 225 avocado acres. I did not take any - I have a brown thumb, when I plant something it usually has an early death.

After the lecture, Mr. & Mrs. Tavangari cooked pizza for us in the classy kiln, accompanied by a delicious salad. I went over to watch what she was doing. She had prepared the dough before we got there, took a ball of dough, whirled it around like you see chefs do, spread something on it, made a round form and handed it to her husband who put on it various condiments then into the kiln. It took very little time for that pizza to be ready and then cut into slices for the watery mouths of the members. It was great pizza!

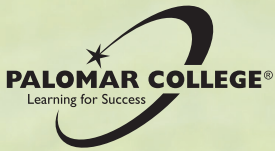
