"Bewilderment" -
by Richard Powers - Fiction

When Theo Byrne and Alyssa decide to marry they are both immersed in their careers and having a child is the last thing on their minds. Theo is an astrobiologist, and Alyssa is an activist for an organization that represents endangered species.

They have a wide range of academic friends. When a renowned researcher in neuroscience asks them to take part in an experiment they agree to help. The experiment relates to exploring decoded neurofeedback. The volunteers enter a suggested emotional state such as: terror, amazement, grief etc. then certain parts of their brains are scanned and their reactions recorded. Their results become a template, and they are known in the lab as "targets". The "trainees" are the second part of the experiment. They are given auditory and visual cues to guide them towards the previously recorded emotions that became the template. The reactions in their brains are also scanned and recorded.

When Alyssa gets pregnant and their son Robin is born, their life in the beginning doesn't change much. He is quiet and loves to draw, but when he enters school he starts having social problems. He has trouble controlling his emotions, and has a difficult time assimilating into the classroom. When Alyssa dies in a car accident his condition gets worse. By the time he is

nine he is diagnosed with 3 different conditions by 2 different doctors, and they both prescribe psychoactive drugs. Theo does not want his son on drugs. When Robin throws his lunch box at his one and only friend at school breaking his cheek bone, the principal gives Theo an ultimatum: Robin either gets help, or she will bring in the state child welfare services. Theo's answer is to seek out his friend the neuroscientist for help and.... Robin becomes a "trainee".

Richard Powers is a former Pulitzer prize winner. When I read this book several years ago I felt emotionally

drained by the ending. I wrote a review, but never submitted it for publication. I now have a very dear friend that has a grandchild that is probably going to face this problem when he enters school. I went back and reread this review and decided that this was a book that needed to be read and talked about because it covered protecting children, school discipline, and government intervention. There are parts of this book that were a little too technical for my taste, but beyond that the most important part was Theo's love for his child and the choices he made as a parent.

National security threat

Last Friday, U.S. Customs and Border Protection sent a bulletin alerting officers that Hamas, Hezbollah, & Islamic Jihad foreign fighters may be encountered at the U.S. southern border. The bulletin provides officers with instructions on critical indicators, including single, military-aged males with undetermined travel plans. This information comes during the same week San Diego Border agents apprehended a former Afghan Army general.

To date this year, Border Patrol agents apprehended 169 terror watchlist individuals. Not only is this a record, but it exceeds the combined totals of the past six years.

In September, there were 269,735 migrant encounters at the southern border, making it the highest single month ever recorded. For the fiscal year 2023, Border Patrols have reported 2.47 million encounters, marking the highest annual total ever recorded in a single year.

In addition to these encounters, there have been over 1.6 million "known gotaways" at the southern border in the last five years. Known gotaways are people seen or detected by Border Patrol agents but not apprehended.

The Federal Government is currently allowing more asylum seekers into the U.S. than Border Patrol agents can manage. Overwhelmed Border Patrol Agents are forced to drop migrants into our communities without resources or travel support. San Diego County experienced a significant influx, with over 22,000 migrants dropped in our community by Border Agents within the past 6 weeks. The year-end projection for migrant arrivals is expected to exceed 50,000 with no end in sight.

Given mounting national security concerns, the current unsustainable border policies are threatening our community's and nation's safety. We must immediately shut down the border, secure it, and restore order.

Supporting female entrepreneurs

The bipartisan California Legislative Women's Caucus (LWC) was formed in 1985 by nine Democrats and six Republicans. Today, 50 of the Legislature's 120 members are women — the Caucus now includes 18 Senators (15 Democrats and three Republicans) and 32 Assemblymembers (27 Democrats and five Republicans).

Reducing barriers that prevent wealth creation for women is a concern for me and for the Women's Caucus. Unfortunately, female entrepreneurs have trouble raising investment funds for new ventures. Despite controlling about \$20 trillion in annual consumer spending worldwide, women-run businesses only receive under 2% of venture capital investments.

Data for the U.S. are no different. In 2018, women-owned startups only got 2% of the \$85 billion raised for venture capital funding, even though women owned 38% of the businesses. And women of color fare even worse. Though their companies are the fastest growing segment of female-owned businesses, they received only 0.2% of venture capital funding.

One possible solution is the growing number of female-owned venture capital companies. They are twice as likely as their male-owned counterparts to invest in companies founded by women. However, additional future funding can still be difficult to obtain.

So what's the answer? Since venture capital is private, direct government involvement is limited. Educating the public, including venture capitalists, may help. This session I co-authored a number of bills designed to heighten public awareness about the need to include women in all areas of the workforce.

These include Assembly Concurrent Resolution 8 (ACR 8) — "Introduce a Girl to Engineering Day;" ACR 42, "Women's Equal Pay Day;" ACR 109, "Women's Small Business Month;" and SCR 29, Women in Construction Week."

I will continue to work with the Legislative Women's Caucus on legislation that reduces barriers for women as they expand their presence in the front office, and throughout the workforce.

There were so many tables I didn't have time to stop by all of them.

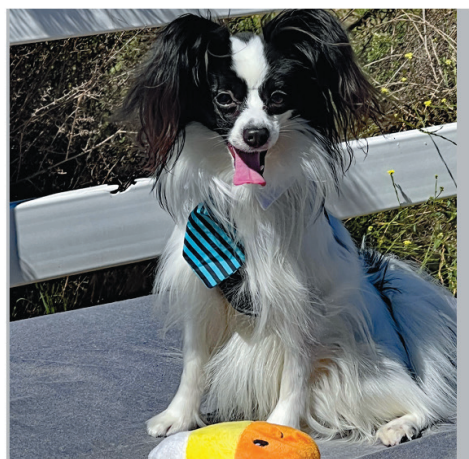

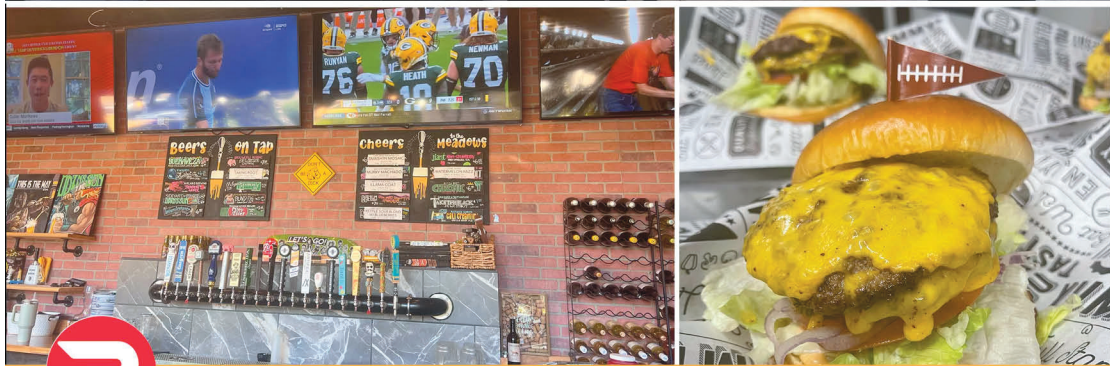
