

Vehicle theft – a crime of opportunity

Auto theft is a common crime in San Diego County that affects victims in many ways. Across the county, there were more than 11,300 auto thefts last year, representing about \$140 million in losses, according to statistics from the San Diego Association of Governments. In fact, last year our office filed more than 850 cases against 900 defendants for auto theft-related charges.

Thankfully, our region has a Regional Auto Theft Taskforce (RATT), that works to reduce vehicle theft in San Diego County. They have taken down many criminal auto theft rings that have led to prosecutions and ultimately jail time for criminals.

Auto theft uniquely disrupts the victim's life, especially in a vehicle-centered city like San Diego where almost every aspect of your daily living revolves around your vehicle. From being unable to get to work, school and doctor's appointments to buying food, the theft of your vehicle can be devastating. But there are ways to be proactive, so you do not become a victim of auto theft. Here are some simple tips that can reduce your probability of becoming a victim of auto theft:

- Do not leave your vehicle doors unlocked. Criminals are opportunists and they will find their way into an unlocked vehicle sooner or later.
- Do not leave items of any value in plain sight in a parked vehicle.
 - Do not leave your keys in your vehicle.
 - Do not leave keys hanging on a hook in your garage.
 - Do not leave your garage door open.

while at the beach or on a hike.

- Do not store a spare key in your garage or second vehicle.
- Do not leave your vehicle unattended while it is running.
- Do not assume your vehicle is safe to be left unlocked because you live in a gated area or have an enclosed parking garage.
- Do not leave car keys in a lockbox attached to your vehicle
- To avoid becoming a victim of identity theft in addition to auto theft, do not leave valuable items in your vehicle.

The harm to victims is compounded when valuables, wallets, checkbooks, or phones are left in a vehicle, and it is stolen. If a thief gains access to the personal identifying information such as your driver's license or credit card, they can illegally use your personal information to make purchases and steal your identity. Some thieves may try to re-sell your vehicle, and if you leave the vehicle title in the vehicle, the bad actor can attempt to transfer title or sell your vehicle to an unsuspecting innocent buyer.

Earlier this Summer, RATT completed a two-year investigation involving 50 defendants. The undercover operation recovered 172 stolen vehicles, drugs, and firearms. RATT's mission cannot be fulfilled without the help of the public. If you have tips or information on vehicle thefts, please let RATT know on the anonymous tip line: 1-888-TELLRAT (888-835-5728).

As your District Attorney, I'm committed to increasing communication and accessibility between the DA's Office and the public in order to keep you safe. I hope these consumer and public safety tips have been helpful.

Record size catfish: The angler who caught the lake record 71.20 pound is Abisai'l Martinez.

Record catfish caught at Lake Wohlford

The big news of the past week at Lake Wohlford was Abisai'l Martinez.

Martinez of Vista catching the new Lake Record Catfish near the Crappie Float.

According to ranger specialist George Scalo, Martinez's fish was caught using a nightcrawler and weighed a whopping 71.20 pounds. "Lake Wohlford cats prefer cut mackerel, shrimp, or chicken liver," said Scalo. "In addition to this behemoth a 32.20 pound catfish was caught by Kona Xiong and a 17.40 pound cat was caught by Somnang Onn. I guess it is safe to say the large catfish are feeding right now."

The trout bite has been brisk with many fish being caught along Senior Shore and in Boat Dock Cove. Matthew Lalourie of Bladensburg, Maryland had the biggest trout of the past week at 6.80 pounds caught on hook-up bait in Willow Cove. Other notable catches included David Colapietro's 6 pound, Robert Jenkin's 5.50 pound, Cary Kimura's 5.40 pound and Anthony Martinez's 4.60 pound trout.

Last Plant: 1,500 lbs. of rainbow trout the week of Dec.24th -30th.

Next Plant: 1,500 lbs. of rainbow trout the week of January 7th – 13th.

Water temperature: At surface 57.02 f., 9.24 D.O. @ 15' 54.68 f., 9.04 D.O.

Water level: Lowlevel, private watercraft are currently banned.

Permits and boat rentals are sold at the Ranger Station. The lake is credit/debit only, no cash transactions. Rangers do not sell fishing licenses so anglers must obtain them elsewhere prior to their visit. The all-day motor boats are \$25 for seniors on Tuesday and Thursdays and to active military every Saturday.

To protect Wohlford from invasive exotic Quagga mussels, there is a ban on private water-craft and equipment that could have been exposed to mussels. Restricted equipment includes; private boats, canoes, kayaks, float tubes, trolling motors, fish finders, anchors, and other equipment that contacts the water.

Each month Whopper Contest winners in four categories are awarded a free fishing and boating permit. Contest winners must legally catch their fish at Lake Wohlford and have it weighed in by a Wohlford Ranger on our scale. 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Hidden Meadows Garden Club Heads for The Light

For the December gathering of the Hidden Meadows Garden Club, the leadership decided that it was time to visit the San Diego Botanic Garden in Encinitas. The only thing the Club is more wary of than a road trip is a nighttime road trip, but they were drawn to go for the very popular Lightscape Show that is run from November 17th and has now been extended to January 7th due to popular demand.

The San Diego Botanic Garden was created in 1970 on 22 acres of donated land (the ex-home of Ruth Baird Larabee) and was originally called the Quail Botanical Garden. It was expanded by another 15 acres and renamed by the County in the early 1980s. Now, this 37-acre urban oasis has 4 miles of meandering trails and ocean views (at least in the daytime). It also hosts 5,300 plant species and varieties, and 29 uniquely themed gardens that represent 15 different regions and many habitats of the world.

The Lightscape Show is installed on one mile of the hillside paths of the Botanic Garden and is an exciting installation that combines nature and lighting art to dazzle the senses of all ages. The show is a combination of light and sound with themed holiday music coming at you from all sides as you wander the paths, awestruck by every variety of lights hidden in and amongst the trees and shrubs. There are hanging lights that look like blossoms, sparkling lights wrapped around every limb of this tree or that, overhead laser light shows, and flashing lights that put Chevy Chase's house in *National Lampoon Christmas Vacation* to shame.

The Hidden Meadows Club members, consisting of Melisa Mitchell (note the absence of hubby Mike Brower, who refused to miss Thursday Night Football) and her mother Judith, Faraj and Yasuko Tavangari, Jane Cairns, Diane Heath and her sister, Mike Quandrozzi, Bonnie and Tom Metzger, Sima Kashani and friends, Kathy and

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Sideyard Public House expands kitchen, menu

If you've never visited the Sideyard Public House in Hidden Meadows, now would be a good time: They are expanding both their kitchen and menu.

Shari Petric, co-owner of the restaurant/pub, says the new menu is coming January 1. Expect some new items like such as ahi and poke dishes, but don't expect changes in quality—like Sideyard's devotion to making all sauces from scratch. And they will always have chef specials.

The expansion of the kitchen makes many things possible for the restaurant, which opened in 2020 during the depths of the pandemic, when opening a restaurant was almost an act of faith. Faith that turned out to be justified for Shari and Alex Petric.

The gamble paid off, so they needed to expand because the place's popularity turned it into a social magnet for the whole community. "We are a vital part of the community," says Sheri. Which meant they needed to expand the kitchen to keep up with demand. "Every weekend every table [and they have 125] is full," she explained. Expanding the restaurant is also a "leap of faith."

With growth, Sideyard has become something of an institution. With so many tables it has become home to several organizations that meet there regularly. "We've become an event venue, with lots of wedding rehearsals," she said. "We never thought we'd do that." Recently a couple celebrated 75 years together there.

It has become a place where people gather. "Some people come five days a week," said Shari. "People who have lost a spouse come to have dinner with friends. "The best thing we have done

for people here is give them a social life."

The day before I visited the Sideyard for this interview, Shari Petric hosted a "Sip and Paint." Local artist, Jacqui Hughes, led a group of women on a journey of art discovery—paired with wine. "We are a fun, welcoming environment where you can get a smile and a great meal!" she said.

And for the Petrics themselves? "It's everything we could have dreamed of," she says. It doesn't hurt that they live one minute from home!

Everything from scratch

They have a selection of burgers all done in the "smash burger" style. Their burgers and burger style sandwiches are the most popular items on the menu. All served on a brioche bun as soft as a cloud. Shari Petric wants people to know that nothing is frozen and they bread their own battered fish tacos.

They constantly ply their customers with samples, to introduce them to new tastes and get their reactions.

Beginning January 1 they will begin offering Brunch from 9 a.m.-noon. Featuring dishes like Eggs Benedict, with homemade hollandaise sauce and biscuits and gravy. "Eggs Benedict is my favorite," said Shari.

Never let it be said that I write about a restaurant without sampling some of its delicacies. This visit was one of the best I've experienced in a while. I tried a plate of Chicken Wings, which are each as meaty as drumsticks and come in Buffalo BBQ, Sweet Thai Chili and Lemon Pepper.

Next I tried the Brussels Sprouts, which is crunchy, sweet and savory all at the same time. You can tell yourself that you're eating healthy.

I also enjoyed the Loaded Tots, with shredded cheese, bacon, sour cream and chives.

Beer Talk

Let's talk beer, and the man to talk it with is Jake Nickelson, who has built the restaurant's collection of brews that includes such royalty as Pliny the Elder and Blind Pig from the Russian River Brewing Company (currently rated Number one among top U.S. craft beer brands), which Nickelson has a professional relationship with. "People drive here for miles, sometimes from LA, to get those beers," he says proudly.

Many customers come to enjoy the Nickelson's company and his people-people loving personality that for some people is like "having a son," said Shari.

Nickelson was previously F&B director at Lake San Marcos, where he built relationships with some of the finest craft beer outlets. "I tend to buy from indies and support small businesses," he said. "I could make life easier by ordering from one distributor, but I don't. I order from twenty to twenty five! It's all about having the best."

They also have a wine list of more than 60 labels, some of them local, others from NAPA. "We have some really good labels," said Nickelson. They also have "a ton" of seltzer waters with flavors like kiwi and pineapple—all fresh. They also have craft cocktails, hard cider and even non-alcoholic beers.

"We hit the holidays hard," said Nickelson. "We have lots of Delirium Tremens (a Belgian Strong Ale from the Huyghe Brewery and Weihenstephaner, a beer from the world's oldest brewery, the Bavarian State Brewery Weihen-

stephan. And he doesn't stop there. Nickelson also brews three house beers, including a house blonde, a house West Coast IPA and a house Milk Stout. This season he brewed a gingerbread stout called Santa's Little Helper. "We have a rotating tap of 20 beers, which is very eclectic," he said. He's always happy to give customers a taste first.

Giving back

They enjoy giving back to the community and just hosted a Toys for Tots for the second year. They frequently do fundraisers where they donate 20% back to the charity, such as Little League or a school or scholarship. "That's just something that a good community restaurant should do, give back to the community that you live in," Shari said.

Every month the staff meets and brainstorms questions such as, "What can we do? What's fun?" They constantly try to up their game. "Next year we will do a tree lighting!" said Shari.

They do a lot of "to go" orders and they just started working with Door Dash—which they hope will be helpful for some of their senior customers who have trouble getting out to eat.

What makes the Sideyard special, said Petric, "is the feeling between the community and my entire staff." A lot of people have become friends by meeting here, she said.

The Sideyard Public House is open 11 a.m.—10 p.m. weekdays and weekends 11 a.m. to midnight. There is live music 6-9 p.m. on Wednesdays and Saturdays and Trivia Thursday, from 6:30-8:30 p.m. The address is 10326 Meadow Glen Way East. The phone is 760-297-1051.
