A shadow box is a frame with a space between the back and the glass which allows you to mount media that is thicker than a photograph to create a 3 dimensional effect. What a great idea for the Garden Club!!

They bought all the materials needed – glue, shadow boxes, tweezers, and many options of colored and patterned background paper. And that's not all, they collected and dried petals from flowers, leaves, ferns, etc. Wow, that was a lot of work!! I wondered how long it took to dry the flowers. Kim commented that you can do it in the microwave, or put the petals in between pages in a book to dry and flatten them, or you can make it easier by buying them on-line.

Upon entering I went straight to the kitchen where there were many trays full of spectacular dried flowers in an array

The dried flowers are very sensitive to the touch and can fall apart, so we had to pick them

with tweezers to place and glue them on the paper backing. When done Melisa would go outside to the patio and spray glue on the frame.

Once you sat to do the project it was quite challenging how to design "something" with all the materials you picked up. We all gave it a try. There was Sima Kashani whose artistic hand designed a beautiful bouquet of flowers; Danielle Milliken doing a design with orange poppies on a blue background – very beautiful; Meredith Kifer whose red flowered top was in competition with her purple and white daisy design; Karen Henderson whose design had large purple delicate flowers and Diane Heath who chose a combination of purple and gold flowers for her

# Join me in stopping the gas tax increase

A few weeks ago, I stood shoulder to shoulder with small business leaders and parents, united with the same message: **the gas tax must be stopped**. On July 1, the gas tax is set to increase by an additional 2 cents per gallon, bringing the total tax burden to a staggering 59.6 cents per gallon.

We are already grappling with the highest gas prices in the nation, rising utility costs, skyrocketing housing expenses, and an overall escalating cost of living. Government should be leaving people alone, not taxing more. This is not the time to add more costs to working families, businesses, and seniors. Government should be looking for ways to save people money, not to make our lives more difficult.

Next week, at the Board of Supervisors meeting, I will bring forward an agenda item urging the governor of California to stop this year's two-cent gas tax increase. If the state stops overspending, there is more than enough money in the state budget to cover these expenses. We constantly hear about a state deficit due to overspending, yet

they want to regulate us more instead of reining in their spending.

We have the highest gas prices in the country because of government policies. This is a government tax, not an increase by big oil. State policies are driving people out of California. I've spoken to many who simply can't afford to live here anymore.

Families are moving out, jobs are disappearing, and the next generation cannot afford a house. We cannot continue to burden everyone with additional taxes. The state faces a \$60 billion deficit this year due to overspending and over-regulating. Taxing people even more amidst the current high cost of living is not the solution. Let's give people a break. Let's stop the exodus from California and ensure our residents are not paying more in taxes.

# Payómkawish Highway

For over 10,000 years, the Luiseño people have lived in the San Luis Rey Valley. Historically, their villages extended along the coastline, and inland along the San Luis Rey River. The largest recorded village was known as Topomai, located in what is now Camp Pendleton. Other historic villages to the east included Páume (Pauma) and Palé (Pala).

The current route of SR 76 was the main path the Luiseños used during their seasonal migrations back and forth from the ocean to the mountains. The historic and cultural significance of this transportation corridor deserves special recognition. Last week I introduced Assembly Concurrent Resolution 215 (ACR 215), which will designate a portion of State Highway Route 76 from Pauma Reservation Road to Rincon Rancho Road as the Payómkawish (People of the West) Highway.

Tribal people and sovereign tribal governments play a significant role in the 75th Assembly District. Local tribes are noted for their achievements in education, economics, and agriculture. They contribute to our economy through job creation, providing educational opportunities and enhancing community safety. They support local charities and assist local governments through planning and mutual aid agreements. As we all remember, their support in wildfire emergencies has been critically important. ACR 215 is a small step toward recognizing the history and significant contributions Luiseño people make to our state and region.

ACR 215 is supported by the Rincon Band of Luiseño Indians, the Pala Band of Mission Indians, the Pauma Band of Luiseño Indians, and the La Jolla Band of Luiseño Indians.

# If someone in an official position tells you to buy gold, it's a scam

Now that buying gold bars has come back into popularity with retailers such as Costco making the purchase easy, those of us in law enforcement are seeing a disturbing trend in which scammers, who are pretending to be government officials, bank representatives or computer technology support experts, are telling victims to buy gold, silver, or other precious metals to protect their funds.

The financially devastating scam, as with many similar schemes, begins with a computer pop-up window telling the user that their computer has been hacked or that a virus has been detected on their device.

There are many iterations of how this scam plays out, such as bad actors saying they are from the Social Security Administration, a banking institution or a tech support employee. The outcome, however, does not vary. It ends with a victim, typically a senior citizen, being defrauded of their financial wealth and dignity.

The most common method is when a scammer fools a victim into thinking their computer has a virus or has been hacked and that the victim needs to allow "Microsoft" or some other company remote access the victim's computer to protect them.

Our San Diego Elder Justice Task Force, made up of local and federal law enforcement partners, works collaboratively to hold these perpetrators accountable in state and federal prosecutions. One recent case involved a Carlsbad victim who reported to police that she was involved in a monthslong scam by fraudsters posing as government, bank and tech-support employees.

Eventually, when the bad actors realized how much the



# Look what we accomplished!

I am so thankful for my faithful Working Wednesday team and other volunteers who've helped us plant a corner of the 200+ acre restoration area at the Mountain Meadow Preserve.

When our team started almost a year and a half ago, there had been three previous planting events, each planting 100 plants, in 2019, 2022 and 2023. Our team planted several more sections starting about a year ago through March. Now when we go back and look, we are in awe of how well the plants are doing. (See the pictures provided.)

The ones that really took off were California sage (an artemisia), elderberry, monkey flower, and black sage. We have also planted oaks, toyons, hollyleaf cherry, buckwheat, ceanothus, and more! Overall, we planted nearly 1000 plants! Now the lesson we learned is that, if you plant that many, you also have to weed and water all of them! And that we have been doing for weeks and will continue to do until we plant again in the fall.

Currently, we have nearly 600 plants in the nursery for planting in the fall.

We don't have the variety we would like so we watch for opportunities to obtain others. We will be planting a large number of California sage as it is habitat for the endangered gnatcatcher. California sage starts nicely from seed, so we have several flats started of those along with black sage. We are experimenting with starting several others from seed. And there are some that just don't want to cooperate with us . . . sugar bush, manzanita are just two. Monkey flower starts nicely from cuttings so we'll start working on that. And I found some hollyleaf redberry in my yard that I am hoping to collect seeds from to attempt propagation from seed.

victim had in savings, they convinced her she could safeguard her funds by obtaining gold bars and sending them to the U.S. Treasury, which would create a locker under her name.

Over the course of two months, the victim sent more than \$1 million via wire transfers to a precious metal business located in San Marcos. She was told to give the precious metal, which was mostly gold, to an individual under the false pretense that it was being secured for safekeeping. She was actually giving her life savings to a criminal network.

Government officials and legitimate businesses will never request you purchase gold or other precious metals.

These tips could help prevent a scam from happening:

- Never allow anyone to install remote access software on your computer or to download apps on your phone.
- Never disclose your home address or agree to meet with unknown individuals to deliver cash or precious metals.
- Do not click on unsolicited pop-ups on your computer, links sent via text messages, or email links and attachments.
- Do not contact unknown telephone numbers provided in pop-ups, texts, or emails.
- Do not allow unknown individuals access to your computer.
- If anyone asks you to pay for something or to secure your money by wiring money, using crypto currency, Bitcoin, gift cards or to pay large sums of cash or buy gold, end contact with that person immediately. You are being scammed
- Immediately talk to someone you trust.
- Never believe anyone who tells you that you will get into trouble if you tell someone else about a situation that involves your money or financial accounts.
- If you suspect that you have been the victim of fraud, report it or any suspicious activities to the FBI IC3 at <a href="https://www.ic3.gov">www.ic3.gov</a> as quickly as possible and also report this to your local police agency. Be sure to include as much transaction information as possible including:
- The name of the person or company that contacted you.
- Methods of communication used, including websites, emails, and telephone numbers.
- Any bank account number to which you wired funds and the recipient's name.
- The name and location of the metal dealer company and the account to which you wired funds, if you were instructed to buy precious metals. If you have been the victim of elder abuse, report it to Adult Protective Services: (800) 339-4661.

"American Mother" - by Colum McCann with Diane Foley - non fiction

Jim Foley was a freelance American journalist that worked in Syria as a war correspondent. He was abducted in 2012 by Isis and was held captive for 2 years before he was killed in 2014. His death became national news.

In the first chapter his mother is sitting at a table in a prison with one of his abductors that is standing trial for his murder. He has requested this meeting, and Diane Foley is under no illusions that she is going to hear the "true" story of her son's imprisonment, but she agrees to meet and hear his story. She asks him one question "Did you beat my son?" He never admits to this even though she was told this by a former captive that is now free.

She spent 2 years trying to find a way to have her son released; but no matter where she turned, whether it was the government or the military, she never found any help. When a ransom was demanded she was told if she tried to raise money she would be prosecuted. Her frustration was written on every page. The only thing that kept her going was her faith and prayer.

This is her story about her son: his life and his death, and the foundation that was started in his name that keeps her moving forward. She now works to help others. Her son's remains have never been found.



The 693-acre Mountain Meadows Preserve, here in Hidden Meadows, is home to The Escondido Creek Conservancy headquarters. The office is the home base for all Conservancy staff, including those who are in the field a lot of the time taking care of nature and providing outdoor education programs for Escondido students.

This preserve was acquired in partnership with San Diego County Parks and Recreation and the Navy/Camp Pendleton. It is part of a larger effort by the conservation partners to preserve natural open spaces in the Escondido Creek watershed and North County. Escondido Creek begins in Bear Valley (east of Lake Wohlford), then travels 26 miles west emptying into the San Elijo Lagoon.
